Focus Questions Student Government, Leadership, and Co-Curricular Programs

The following three recommendations from the Civic Mission of Schools report could have applications for student government, student leadership programs and classes, and co-curricular program offerings.

Recommendation # 3: Give the students the opportunity to apply what they learn through community service linked to the formal curriculum and classroom instruction.
What do we already do that addresses this recommendation?
How might we enhance our program to provide opportunities for service learning?
What curricular connections might we make with service-learning experiences?
What civic knowledge, skills, or dispositions might service-learning activities develop in our students?

Recommendation #4: Offer extracurricular activities that involve students in their schools and communities.
How do our co-curricular programs already involve students in the school and community?
Are our students building civic knowledge, skills, or dispositions through our co-curricular programs? If so, how?
What might we do to further enhance our co-curricular programs to integrate the CMS recommendations?

Recommendation #5: Encourage student participation in school governance.
In what ways do our students already participate in governance at this school?
What civic knowledge, skills, or dispositions do these opportunities foster?
Are there ways we could provide more opportunities for students to participate in school governance that would foster civic knowledge, skills, or dispositions?
